Aleksandr V. Lavrent'ev. "Konchak, knyaginya velikaa Yuryeva (Yury's Grand Princess), tsar's sister": the marriage of Grand Prince Yury Danilovich and the relations of Moscow, the Golden Horde and Tver in the 1310s–1320s.

Summary: The article is focused on the short-time marriage of Yury Danilovich (one of the first Moscow princes who became the Grand Prince of Vladimir) and Konchaka-Agafya (baptized sister of Uzbek Khan of the Golden Horde). It was the first of the few "international" marriages in the family of Moscow sovereigns in the 14th-15th centuries. The name of the Grand Princess descent from Genghis Khan is mentioned passingly in chronicles and other Russian medieval sources. Due to the lack of information, there are many questions about her life before marriage, the marriage itself, her death and legacy. Moreover, "Konchak, knyaginya velikaa Yuryeva" was involved, with or without meaning to, in the foreign policy tension between Moscow and Tver fighting for Grand Princedom status, in which her brother, the Khan of the Golden Horde, took an active part. The article attempts to reconstruct the biography of Grand Princess Konchaka-Agafya against the background of political events of the 1310s–1320s.

Anton V. Sergeev. Princes Pronsky in the Russian state of the 16th-17th centuries: historical and genealogical research.

Summary: The article deals with the genealogy, official activity, and evolution of land ownership of Ryazan Rurikid princes Pronsky, including the composition of the Russian line of this family, the total number of its male part, *Mestnichestvo* disputes involving the Pronskys, and the influence of political and demographic factors on their socio-political evolution in the 16th–17th centuries. The appendix to the article contains the genealogies of the Pronskys, taken from two unpublished genealogical books, and acts on land ownership of the family.

Larisa M. Bogatova. Inspection logs of the Imperial Moscow Orphanage as a source for history and genealogy.

Summary: On June 25, 1837, Nicholas I signed a decree, according to which all the orphans and foundlings of unknown origin were nourished in peasant families, and, if they survived to adulthood, were assigned as state peasants. To control them, the rural expedition was created, a staff of mobile doctors was hired, and Instructions were issued for these doctors. Their inspections were documented in so-called inspection logs, which are now stored in the Central State Archive of the City of Moscow and have never been analysed before. This article discusses the features of log keeping and the historical and genealogical significance of these materials.

The boyar book in column form, 1630–1631 (publication by Egor N. Gorbatov).

Summary: This publication presents a members' list of the Sovereign's court, dated 1630–1631. It includes the information about their salaries. M.P. Lukichev defines manuscripts of this type as boyar books in column form. This document also supplements data on personnel of the Court, since the "authentic" boyar lists of this period did not survive in complete form.

Materials of the horse troops review at the Moscow Sovereign's court in 7161 (1653). Part 1: "Skazki" (testimonies) by Moscow nobles, foreign service-men and solicitors about readiness for regimental service (June 1653) (publication by Maksim R. Belousov).

Summary: The publication presents the first part of the materials related to the horse troops review at the Moscow Sovereign's court in the summer of 1653. The publication includes all currently known "skazki" (testimonies), submitted at the review: 416 "skazki" by Moscow nobles, 33 "skazki" by foreign service-men from the Moscow list, 58 "skazki" by solicitors and 4 "skazki" by other persons. The introductory article substantiates the proposed dates of "skazki" in the context of the other documents related to the horse troops review.

Desyatnya of the Temnikovsky Tatars, 1658/59 (publication by **Andrej V. Belyakov**).

Summary: The publication contains a list of the service class Tatars of Temnikovsky uyezd, compiled in 1658/59 during the military call-up of the Tatars of Meshchera as reiters. The surviving part of the list contains information about 588 persons, including the murzas.

The boyar book of 1667 (publication by Vadim A. Kadik).

Summary: The book of 1667 is the next one after the previously published similar manuscript of 1658. It was in use of the Razryadny Prikaz for almost ten years after the original text was compiled. So, the book commits the changes in the active roll of the Moscow service elite after the conclusion of the Truce of Andrusovo and in the last years of the reign of Alexei Mikhailovich.

Officialdom and nobility of Tver and Tverskoy uyezd at the beginning of the 19th century (according to the confessional lists of urban and rural parishes) (compiled by Andrej V. Matison).

Summary: The reference material includes information about the officials and nobles mentioned in the confessional lists of the city churches of Tver in 1800 and the nobles mentioned in the confessional lists of Tverskoy uyezd in 1800 and 1802. It includes data not only about the nobles who used to live in their estates, but also about all the landowners of Tverskoy uyezd. Subsequently, a significant part of the lands mentioned during this period as a territory of Tverskoy uyezd was incorporated into Korchevsky uyezd.
