**Adrian A. Selin.** *Officials in the management of small towns of Novgorod land in 1611–1617: Staraya Russa.*

**Summary:** The article is dedicated to management and officials of Staraya Russa in 1611–1617. It covers the biographies of the clerks in the city during this period, their functionality and specific tasks in administration within the changeable and complex political context.

**Ol'ga V. Novohatko.** *The length of service of Moscow and «gorodovye» (urban) officials in the 17th century (according to their resignation petitions from the registration books of Razryadny Prikaz).*

**Summary:** The article discusses the age of entry and retirement, as well as the length of service of metropolitan officials and «gorodovye» (urban) nobles in mid-to-late 17th century Russia. The study is based on materials from the registration books of resignation petitions. The service people by birth submitted these petitions to Razryadny Prikaz (Order-in-charge), the control unit. The results specify the nature and some features of state service of Russian nobility in the Early Modern period.

**Konstantin V. Petrov.** *Social mobility of the clergymen (the Kursk priests Afanasievs from the Korovin family, 17th – early 20th century).*

**Summary:** The article discusses the origin and kinship of one family from Kursk province of the 19th century, the Afanasievs, most of whom belonged to the clergy, the rest to honorary citizens, nobles, and provincial and county officials. It turns out that the Afanasievs, for unknown reasons, adopted this surname in the mid-to-late 18th century. They belonged to the old family of the Kursk boyar scions Korovins. Among them was a line of clergymen who for many generations had been associated with service in the St. George's Church of Shumakovo village and the Epiphany Church of the village of the same name in Kursk county.

**Andrej V. Matison.** *Genealogical periodicals in Russia, the late 20th – first quarter of the 21st century.*

**Summary:** The overview examines the general trends and directions for the development of genealogical periodicals in Russia in recent decades. The features of emergence, functioning and extinction of various periodicals in the capitals and the provinces are determined. It is concluded that the range of genealogical periodicals in the 1990s – early 2000s was quite wide and, in part, remains so to this day despite the disappearance of many titles.

***Materials of inspection of nobles and boyar scions from different cities, who accompanied Russian ambassadors to negotiations with the Swedes. Tikhvin, 1616*** (publication by Andrej Yu. Kabanov).

**Summary:** The publication includes the materials of inspection of nobles and boyar scions, who accompanied the Russian ambassadors to negotiations with the Swedish delegation in Stolbovo village. The inspection took place in Tikhvin on March 6, 1616. The document was compiled after January 20, 1617. It contains the information on two Moscow nobles, four service class Tatars and 332 nobles and boyar scions, representing 23 «military cities» of the Moscow state. In Russian historiography this document has yet to be used.

***The «existent» boyar list and the razriad list of «the Sergiev journey» of September 1628*** (publication by Egor N. Gorbatov).

**Summary:** This publication presents the «existent» boyar list and the razriad list of «the Sergiev journey», dated September 1628. The names of the serving people in the boyar list are divided into work-related «halves» – «Moscow» and «vacation». The razriad list of «the Sergiev journey» is an addition to the boyar list. It contains a list of names of serving people appointed to accompany the Tsar and the Tsarina on a pilgrimage to the Trinity Sergius Monastery, as well as those left in Moscow «to spend day and night» in the palace in the absence of the Tsar. This list is also interesting because it names the boyars and female servants who accompanied the Tsarina. The data is unique for this period.

***Suzdal «authentic» lists of the late 1630s – early 1640s*** (publication by Vadim A. Kadik).

**Summary:** This publication presents previously unpublished «authentic» lists of nobles and boyar scions of one of the oldest county corporations in Zamoskovny Krai, dating back to the second quarter of the 17th century. The corpus of «authentic» lists, along with desyatni, is the most valuable source on composition and structure of the «military cities» of the 17th century Russian state. The four documents presented in this publication were preserved with minor losses. They shed light on the nature of provincial nobles' service during the first decade after the Smolensk war.

***The desyatnya of the Meshchyora Tatars 1642/43*** (publication by Andrej V. Belyakov).

**Summary:** The desyatnya of the Meshchyora Tatars of 1642/43 contains a list of the service class Tatars of Alatyr, Arzamas, Kadom, Kasimov and Temnik counties. This document significantly expands our understanding of genealogy and social structure of the service class Tatars of Meschyora and surrounding territories.

***Personnel rosters of the voivodes Prince Yakov Kudenetovich Cherkassky and Prince Yuri Alekseevich Dolgorukov's regiment, with brief information about the service people's participation in the Russian-Polish war in 1663–1664*** (publication by Leonid E. Shabaev).

**Summary:** The publication includes draft and fair lists of nobles and boyar scions of the Yakov Kudenetovich Cherkassky's, later of Yuri Alekseevich Dolgorukov's regiment. These lists contain information about the participants of the 1663-1664 march on Lithuanian cities, indicating those «on vacation», as well as those who fled from service or did not take part in the campaign. The publication also includes a list containing information on the location of military personnel of the same regiment in Sevsk in 1663. The names of the serving people in this list are specified by their cities of origin.

*The resignation petitions of «Moscow ranks», 1702 (publication by Valerij D. Kochetkov, Sergej V. Sirotkin).*

**Summary:** The publication presents more than 300 petitions of Moscow service class people for retirement from regimental service, submitted to Razryadny Prikaz in 1702. These documents contain information about places and terms of the petitioners' service, about their injuries, wounds and illnesses, financial and marital status. This data is extremely important for historical and genealogical research.

*«The origin of the Princes Vyazemsky» by M.E. Bychkova (publication by Oleg I. Horuzhenko).*

**Summary:** This unpublished article by M.E. Bychkova is found in her files, which are currently being transferred to the scientific archive of the Institute of Russian History, the Russian Academy of Sciences. The paper examines the formation of the pedigree legend of the Princes Vyazemsky. Special attention is paid to the completeness of the Vyazemsky family's genealogical register as part of the Archive V list of the Patriarchal edition of the pedigree books.

*Zaotsk «military cities» according to the desyatni and lists of the 1620s – 1630s. (Index of personnel of the nobles and boyar scions of Kaluga, Borovsk, Vorotynsk, Kozelsk, Likhvin, Medyn, Meshchovsk, Serpeysk, Yaroslavets Maly) (compiled by Vyacheslav N. Kozlyakov).*

**Summary:** The reference material continues the publication of data on the nobles and boyar scions of the 1620s – 1630s. The information of the sources is structured according to general headings: surname, first name and patronymic, «city», rank, land grant and monetary salary. In total, data on more than 800 nobles and boyar children is found in the registered documents of Zaotsk «military cities».
