

## SUMMARIES

*The book of salaries distribution to zhil'tsy of 1618* (publication by *Andrej Yu. Kabanov*).

**Summary:** This document is a book of distribution of monetary salaries to zhil'tsy before their deployment in the summer of 1618. It contains information on 214 zhil'tsy, who held the lowest rank of the Sovereign's Court of the Muscovite State. The document is particularly valuable due to the fact that it contains information on the salaries of 144 zhil'tsy. This information is missing from most known documents.

**Keywords.** zhil'tsy, distribution book (kniga razdachi), salary, guarantee, monetary salary, service.

*Documents on the personnel of service people in Voronezh in the first half – mid-17th century: the original list of 1614–1618, lists of service people from the estimate books of 1642 and 1653* (publication by *Maksim D. Kurkovich*).

**Summary:** This publication includes lists of Voronezh service people from the 17th century, previously unpublished. Since virtually no desyatens for Voronezh have survived, these documents help fill the gap. The published authentic list from 1614–1618 is the earliest list of Voronezh boyar scions discovered to date, and its compilation preceded the 1615 survey book. The 1642 estimate book documents in detail the state of affairs in Voronezh and the Voronezh district, not limited to information on service people. The 1653 estimate book contains information rare for this type of source – details on estate and monetary salaries, family members in service, and the weapons and equipment of service people. Thus, all three published cases are of high value for the history of Voronezh and the service corporations of the 17th century in general.

*Cases on the award of ranks “by kinship”. Part 3 (1632–1636)* (publication by *Leonid E. Shabaev*).

**Summary:** The publication continues a series of documents related to the cases of promotion in ranks “by kinship”, stored in the Razryadny Prikaz funds. The third part covers the period from 1632 to 1636 and includes 250 cases containing information about 172 families.

*The Boyar “authentic” register of 7189 (1680/81), “who has peasant households, and in which towns”* (publication by *Valerij D. Kochetkov, Viktoriya D. Kochetkova, Sergej V. Sirotkin*).

**Summary:** The publication contains a roster compiled for the review in early 1681, which includes information on the ranks of the Sovereign's Court (stewards, solicitors, Mos-

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cow nobles) and the number of peasant and *boby* households registered to them. Subsequently, by the tsar's decree, the Discharge Prikaz (Razryad) formed a group consisting of officials from the Sovereign's Court and the scribes subordinate to them. This group was tasked with preparing a detailed register of service people with data on their service, the number of peasant and other households registered to them, and their armaments. The notes and marginal annotations present in the roster attest to the work done to clarify the data characterizing the material status of the servicemen. The document also contains information on the family relations of the individuals listed in it.

***Nikita V. Belov. The first attempt at writing the history of Ivan the Terrible's family.***

**Summary:** The review analyzes the monograph by T.D. Panova, dedicated to the history of the family of Tsar Ivan IV (the Terrible). The book's main merit is its popularization of the archaeological and anthropological findings and discoveries made by the scientific team under the leadership of T.D. Panova. Its significant shortcomings stem from the author's unreliable handling of scholarly literature and written sources. For the first time, the review's text publishes the article "On the Tsaritsas of Tsar Ivan Vasilyevich" from the "Yelagin Miscellany" of the second half of the 17th century.
